

In 1937 another two cottages were built, and the capital fund rose to £16,601 12 9d., in 1938 this rose to £19,130. The cottages now numbered twenty, and applicants were numerous.

With the advent of war in 1939, a local sub-committee of Mauchline residents was formed to administrate, any other problems being referred to the Secretary in Glasgow. Over this wartime period, until 1945 the capital sum rose to £33,276, owing to wartime restrictions on the building of new cottages.

The period from 1945-50 was a period of consolidation during which various improvements were made, the cottages being in great demand and always occupied.


By 1951 the capital sum had reached £46,800, and plans were produced shortly after to erect a community hall to be used for meetings and recreational pursuits and a bowling green. After much thought the work was commenced and the first use of these facilities was made in 1955.

With wartime restrictions now over, efforts were made to improve the facilities available in the cottages, including an alarm system to call the caretaker if illness was prevalent in a house. The work of the Society continued with much good work being quietly and considerately done by the Committee members and with the support of Radio Appeals and Legacies.

The Society was unfortunate to lose the services owing to death of Sir A. D. McInnes Shaw in 1957.

In 1959, Scottish Television featured the Homes in a general programme about the Poet.

In 1960, The President Mr. John C. Sword died, and Sir Claud Hagart Alexander of Ballochmyle was appointed in his place, and so the work of the Society continues, perpetuating the original founders wish to erect a suitable memorial to Scotlands greatest poet, and at the same time, do good with it.



Foreword

THERE are many memorials and museums in the County of Ayr, Scotland, and indeed throughout the world dedicated to Robert Burns. Few of these memorials, however, take a similar form to the National Burns Memorial and Cottage Homes in Mauchline.

Founded and built only comparatively recently, building commenced in 1895 and this memorial can indeed be said to be a "Living Memorial" to a great Poet. Robert Burns had a very strong feeling for his fellow men and he would surely have been glad to lend his name to a charity such as these Cottage Homes for old people.


These homes were built and are maintained and looked after with funds raised by public subscription and donations. Also of course the entrance charges to the Tower and museum make a useful contribution to the cost of running the Cottage Homes.

There is an historical note on the National Burns Memorial and Cottage Homes, which you will find of interest, further on in this booklet together with a catalogue of the many interesting exhibits which you may see in the museum.

The view from the top of the tower is probably the best view of the "Burns Country" to be seen from any one place.

When you have looked through the Museum and enjoyed the view from the top of the tower, please remember the National Burns Memorial and Cottage Homes is primarily a "Living Memorial"; a charity dedicated to Robert Burns, which attempts, with help from the public, to carry out at least one of his great ideals—to look after some of our fellow men and women who have no homes of their own and who are too old for regular work.





A Brief History of the

In 1888, in the Alexandra Hotel, Glasgow amidst great enthusiasm, the Glasgow Mauchline Society was formed. The meeting was convened by Mr. J. Leiper Gemmill, Writer, Glasgow, and amongst the prominent supporters were, The Rev. Andrew Edgar, The Rev. Wilson Baird, Mr. Hamilton Marr, Mr. Hugh Alexander, Bailie John Marr, Mr. Thomas Killin, Mr. Marcus Bain, Mr. James Kirkland, Mr. Gilbert Ramsay, Mr. Robert Alexander and Mr. J. Taylor Gibb. These gentlemen were all connected with Mauchline, either by birth or residence.

Seven years later in 1895, the Directors decided to build a museum in the shape of a tower, with five cottage homes for deserving people who had fallen on hard times. This was to be known as the National Burns Memorial and Cottage Homes and to be a permanent memorial to the Poet Burns, symbolising his sympathy for the genuinely unfortunate.

A legacy of £1000 from the late Mr. Thomas Anderson of Bathgate was received and on the 4th July 1896, Mr. J. Leiper Gemmill, the President cut the first sod, and later on the 23rd he presided at a gathering of over 10,000 people when the foundation stone was laid by Mr. Hugh Wallace the Provincial Grand Master, after which a banquet was held.

Memorial and Cottage Homes

Another house was erected in 1930 thanks to a legacy from the late Mr. G. Bulloch. The first sod for these additional houses was cut by the great grand daughter of the Poet, and in 1931, another five houses were opened by her son, the great grandson of the Poet.

In 1931, a broadcast appeal was made by Mr. John Leiper Gemmill, and a satisfactory sum was raised, including an anonymous £1000 from a lady who asked that the name Alford be incorporated in one of the houses.

The following year, a donation of £500 was received from the Newcastle-upon-Tyne Burns Statue Fund, and one of the houses in the West Wing was accordingly named — The Newcastle-upon-Tyne Burns House.

The Directors decided to rename the society "The National Burns Memorial and Cottage Homes," and took over the assets of the Glasgow Mauchline Society. This was done to broaden the Constitution, and to carry on the activities of the Society under the name that for many years was widely known.

In 1933, the Society suffered greatly from the death of Mr. Thomas Killin, J.P., of Glasgow, who was an office-bearer for 44 years and of Mr. William Campbell, Stockbroker who acted as Hon. Secy for 33 years. The Society owed much to the valuable service given by these two gentlemen.

The President Mr. J. L. Gemmill also reported that year that the Duke and Duchess of York had consented to become patrons, and that the Lord Provosts of Glasgow and Edinburgh had consented to become Hon. Presidents and Mr. T. Muir Wilson became Hon. Secretary.

In 1934, the President Mr. J. Leiper Gemmill died, and in memory of his services to the Society, the committee placed a memorial plate inside the tower.

The family of the late President presented seats suitably inscribed for the benefit of the cottagers in memory of his many devoted years of service.

In 1935, a broadcast appeal was made by the Lord Provost of Glasgow and this proved to be very successful. Mr. John Marr was elected President in place of the late Mr. J. L. Gemmill, but unhappily died within the year. Two new cottages were built during this year, and Lieut. Col. A. D. McInnes Shaw, D.S.O., J.P. was elected President, and Mr. John C. Sword, Vice-President.












The original Glenriddell-Burns MSS. was compiled by Burns as a gift to Mrs. and Mrs. Walter Riddell, of Woodley Park, Dumfries. Soon after the Poet's death it and many other papers were sent to Dr. James Currie, Liverpool, to assist him in editing the Life and Writings of Burns. It was omitted to be returned, and ultimately Dr. Currie's daughter entrusted it to The Liverpool Athenaeum who, in 1913, notwithstanding the protests of the descendants of Burns and Burns Clubs, sold it to Messrs. Sotheby of London, for, it is understood, £5,000. Colonel John Gribbel, who thought the Liverpool Athenaeum should not have sold the MSS., as it was got by them in trust, generously re-purchased it at a considerably higher figure, and presented it to The National Library of Scotland to be preserved for Scotland. Mr. Gribbel had facsimiles made of the MSS. and presented these two volumes to this Museum.

- (4) Robert Burns Hutchinson, only son of Mrs. Sarah Burns Hutchinson, and great grandson of the Poet. He has resided for many years in British Columbia and has five of a family.
- (5) Mrs. Annie Vincent Burns Hutchinson Scott, eldest daughter of Mrs. Sarah Hutchinson and great grand-daughter of the Poet. She married Mr. James Scott, but is now a widow and resides at Ortunga, Largs Bay, South Australia. She has no family.

- (6) Mrs. Violet Burns Hutchinson Gowring, second daughter of Mrs. Sarah Burns Hutchinson and great grand-daughter of the Poet. She married Mr. George H. Gowring, and they reside at St. Bede's Eastbourne. She has one son, Ian Burns Gowring, a Civil Engineer, whose photograph is No. 67 of this Catalogue.
- (7) Margaret Constance Burns Hutchinson, the youngest daughter of Mrs. Sarah Burns Hutchinson. She died unmarried in 1917.
- (8) Dorothy Burns Hutchinson, the eldest daughter of Robert Burns Hutchinson, and as such a great great grand-daughter of the Poet. She lives in Canada and is married.

The album and photographs are meantime lent to the Museum by Mr. J. Leiper Gemmill.

Note.—During the last 35 years I have had the privilege of meeting and corresponding with all these descendants of the Poet. They and Mrs. Burns Thomas (See No. 134) were all well educated with much literary ability, refined tastes, kindly, sympathetic natures, well living and greatly respected. Admirers of Burns may well be proud of his descendants. Their fine clear-cut features will be noted, and when the photographs were taken, many years ago, some of them were about the same age as Burns and have a marked resemblance to him.—J. Mauchline - Past and Present

Mauchline, old spellings Machlin, Mauchlin, from the Gaelic "magh" and "lyn"—the plain with the pool: in former days Loch Brown was about one mile west of the Town but was drained when the railway from Kilmarnock was built.

The first recorded mention of Mauchline is in a reference to a battle fought on Mauchline Moor in 681 when the Cruithni were defeated by the Alcluydensians of Strathclyde a further battle being fought there in 702.

In 1165 Walter son of Alan, High Steward of Scotland, granted a Charter to the Cistercian Monks of Melrose of the lands of Mauchlin, in these days the Parish extended to the boundaries of Lanarkshire at Glenbuck.

The old tower, behind the Parish Church, now known as Mauchline Castle was built by the monks and probably formed part of the Priory. The building is now in disuse but the ceiling of the upper room is an interesting example of the architecture of the period. The old parish church which stood on the site of the present one, and which was the scene of Burns' "Holy Fair" was demolished in the early part of last century.

Mauchline was created a free burgh of barony by James IV in 1510 and was granted a further Charter in 1610, both these Charters however have been lost and are believed to have been burned in a fire at Register House, Edinburgh, in the 17th century.

At the time of the Reformation Mauchline was a centre for the reformers and George Wishart was debarred from preaching in the Church in 1544 by the Sheriff of Ayr at the head of an armed force whereupon Wishart retreated to Mauchline Moor and preached to a large congregation in the open.

In 1585 five men of the parish were executed on the Loan Green for their religious views. The old stone marking the site is now set in the school wall and a new monument has been erected on the grave.

The original inscription reads:—

"Bloody Dumbarton, Douglas and Dundee,
Moved by the Devil and the Laird of Lee,
Dragg'd these five men to death with gun and sword,
Not suffering them to pray nor read God's word;
Owning the work of God was all their crime;
The eighty-five was a saint-killing time."

In 1647 another battle took place on the Moor on this occasion between the King's troops and the Covenanters the latter claiming the victory.

After the Reformation the lands of Mauchline passed into the hands of the Earls of Loudoun and no further historical events are recorded of the Parish.

In the time of Burns, Gavin Hamilton lived in the house next to the old Castle, the house where Burns and Jean Armour set up home is in Castle Street as is Nance Tinnock's: across the road from Poosie Nansie's on the gable of what was the Whitford Arms and is now a shop will be found a plaque reading:—


"This is the hoose though built anew
Where Burns cam' weary frae the plough
To hae a crack wi' Johnnie Doo
On nichts at e'en
And whiles tae taste his mountain dew
Wi Bonnie Jean."


Jean Armour's father's house was at the corner of Cowgate and Howard Place.

During the 19th century industries in Mauchline consisted of Mills at the Haugh and various Box-Works in the Town itself. These Box-Works made fancy trinket boxes and snuff boxes decorated with tartan and with wooden hinges. The last Box-Work closed down at the outbreak of the second World War. Mauchline was also famed for the red sandstone which was quarried until recent years. There still exists in Mauchline the principal Curling Stone manufacturers in the World exporting stones to America, Canada, Scandinavia and Switzerland.

Amongst other industries are coal, optical manufacturing and dairy farming.

The latter is particularly well known, as the quality of the cheese and butter etc. are universally recognised.
